County announces new disc golf course at Stables

Thanks to a generous donation from three local residents, Georgetown County Parks and Recreation will soon be able to offer a second disc golf course for area residents to enjoy.

The first course, located in East Bay Park in Georgetown, has been open for several years now. The new course will be located at Stables Park, in the area between the Waccamaw Regional Tennis Center and park's field complex. It was made possible through the efforts of local residents Jonathan Poole, Tom Housner and Blaine Harvey.

Poole, who served as the course's primary designer, said that Stables Park was an ideal spot to host a course he hopes newcomers, families, and seasoned disc golf veterans will enjoy.

"Disc golf is a great form of outdoor recreation that is also very affordable. Most people already own Frisbees they can use," Poole said. "From a construction standpoint, it's been pretty easy because the property is so open. We showcase the beautiful live oaks that are out there, and there are three ponds on the course so there are a variety of different shots that bring the water into play. There's a lot of people in this area who have never



played disc golf, so the course needed to be accommodating for them as well as challenging for advanced players. That's what we tried to create."

Poole is a long-time veteran of the disc golf industry, having worked for Innova Champion Discs for 21 years. Housner helped Poole with the majority of the "heavy lifting" during construction, moving downed branches and tree limbs while also assisting with pouring cement to help anchor the goals. Harvey has been primarily

In Memoriam: Midway Fire Rescue says goodbye to firefighter, friend

Joshua Powers Carney, a battalion chief with Midway Fire Rescue, died of cancer at his residence surrounded by his loving family on Oct. 19. He was 41.

It was a tragic loss for the community, but especially for his friends and colleagues at Midway, in addition to his family. He was an 18-year veteran at Midway and had been diagnosed with an aggressive form of melanoma just four months ago.

A packed funeral service took place at Holy Cross Faith Memorial Episcopal Church in Pawleys Island on Oct. 27. There were so many people in attendance, the county provided a shuttle service to allow for off-site parking.

After Carney's passing, Midway

Chief Doug Eggiman encouraged mourners to draw from Carney's own words as they work through their grief. In a letter to Midway staff, Carney had written of "good times, bad times, obstacles to over-

come, challenges to face, times you want to forget and times you will cherish forever."

"It is through these experiences that we learn," Carney wrote. "We learn what not to do, and we learn what makes us stronger as an individual and as a team. We need to always be learning, and wanting to grow ourselves and those around us. Individually we each have the opportunity to make a choice. What are you doing to take care of other brothers and sisters? What are you doing to bring them up in spirit, raising them when they are down? Together, we find comfort and strength to carry on. After all, the band on your arm reads 'We're in This Together'."

Accommodations Tax Committee to make recommendations Nov. 16

The Georgetown County Accommodations Tax Committee met on Nov. 9 to review A-Tax grant application packets and to hear applicants present their applications. There were 13 applications received totaling \$921,687. Only \$821,659 in funds are available to award.

Accommodations tax funds are collected on temporary rentals, such as hotel rooms, throughout the year. The funds are then put back into activities that increase tourism in the county through the award of grants for projects.

The Committee will meet again on Thursday, Nov. 16, at 9 a.m. to decide on their award recommendations to be presented to County Council. The meeting will take place in County Chambers at the historic Georgetown County Courthouse, located at 129 Screven Street in Georgetown. The presentation to council will be made at council's meeting on Tuesday, Dec. 12.

Program looks at prehistoric archaeology

Native American history expert Chris Judge will give a free lecture and hands-on exploration of artifacts at the Waccamaw Library on Nov. 17 at 10 a.m.

The lecture is associated with an exhibit at the Native American Studies Center at USC—Lancaster that focuses on prehistoric Native American history. Judge is the Director of the Native American Studies Center at USC—Lancaster, where he teaches courses in anthropology, archaeology and Native American Studies. After earning bachelors and masters degrees in anthropology from USC—Columbia, he has devoted his life to the study of Native Americans in South Carolina.

“In the lecture I talk about the major periods in South Carolina prehistory—Paleoindian: 19,000-10,000 years ago, Archaic: 10,000-3,000 years ago, Woodland: 3000-1000 years ago and Mississippian: 1000-400 years ago,” Judge explained. “As I am lecturing, I pass

around artifacts and share a little of that human touch.”

Judge is active in many archeological and anthropology organizations, including the Native American Advisory Committee and S.C. Commission for Minority Affairs. In 2006, he joined the faculty at USC—Lancaster to help build the newly formed Native American Studies program. He was appointed assistant director of Native American Studies in 2007. By 2012, Judge served as building supervisor for the 15,000-square-foot Native American Studies Center that houses galleries, special collections, archives, archaeology, Catawba language and folklore labs, and classrooms. He also runs a public archaeology lab at the center, inviting volunteer members of the public of all ages to wash and sort artifacts recovered from the Kolb site.




County, residents continue to discuss Pennyroyal Rd.

Georgetown County Council's Landuse Committee and Economic Development Director Brian Tucker met in a lengthy session Oct. 26 with residents of the Pennyroyal Road area. The economic development department is seeking to rezone about 950 acres between Pennyroyal and the Sampit River to lure industry and jobs to the county. Residents are opposed to bringing more heavy industrial jobs to their area. County officials hoped some compromises could be reached at the meeting. No compromise was reached, but residents did present detailed information on their concerns for council members to review. Joseph Williamson, a technical systems administrator with Midway Fire Rescue, has been selected as Georgetown County's Employee of the Quarter for the third quarter of this year. He will be recognized by Georgetown County Council at its 5:30 p.m. meeting on Dec. 12 at the historic courthouse in Georgetown.



An employee with Georgetown County Emergency Services since 2001, Williamson was integral to the success of several important projects during the third quarter, said Sam Hodge, Georgetown County's Emergency Manager. Hodge nominated Williamson for the award. Williamson is described as a "go-to employee" known for being reliable and who always gets the job done.

Among the projects Williamson assisted in was the emergency management component of managing the huge influx of visitors that poured into the county this summer to view the total solar eclipse. He was instrumental in developing a redundant communications plan in the event emergency services lost communications and put safeguards in place to ensure communications stayed in place for emergency response agencies throughout the county.

Williamson spearheaded an upgrade of the P25 to 800mhz radio system for Georgetown County Emergency Services, as well as the Sheriff's Office and municipal emergency response agencies. Countless hours went into the project and ensuring a smooth transition.

Williamson also helped develop a HAM radio plan to give redundancy in communications, accepted an invitation to serve on the S.C. Communication Task Force, and assisted with the set up of computers and AV equipment for the SC Emergency Management Association Conference.

"When I look for nominees for this award, I look for someone who not only serves their own department, but the county as a whole," Hodge said. "Joseph is the perfect example of a team player."

Sheriff's Dept. offers active shooter training

In light of the recent tragic event that occurred in Texas, the Georgetown County Sheriff's Office, a state accredited agency, would like to remind residents, businesses and churches that it continues to offer an active shooter training course to teach people what to do if they are ever in a place where a shooter begins firing.

Since the inception of the training program in January 2015, about 1,500 people have participated. Participants include members of the local school district, churches, businesses and utilities, along with members of Georgetown County government and judicial services.

The purpose of this class is to familiarize participants on situational awareness, protection and survival strategies, basic active shooter traits, state laws on concealed weapons, and how to respond and react in a mass casualty event.

The class is available to all Georgetown County residents, businesses and churches at no cost. It lasts up to two hours and can be instructed at the Georgetown County Sheriff's Office or at the requesting organization's location. Classes are scheduled in advance with the Sheriff's Office's training division.

Driver's licenses and IDs changing

Anyone who wants to use their S.C. driver's license or identification card to pass airport security, enter secure federal buildings or visit military installations, will soon need to change it to a REAL ID license or identification card. REAL IDs will be available in early 2018.

Anyone who wants to change their license or ID will have to bring **all** of the following items to their local branch of the S.C. Department of Motor Vehicles:

- Proof of identify, such as a birth certificate or valid U.S. passport.
- Proof of Social Security Number, such as a Social Security card or W-2 form that has your SSN, name and employer's name.
- Two proofs of current physical address, such as a current S.C. driver's license or ID and a utility bill no more than 90 days old that show the same name and address.
- Proof of all legal name changes, such as marriage license or court order issued by your county's probate or family court. You must present a complete name change history that links your birth certificate name to your present day name.

Only original documents or certified copies of all documents will be accepted. The DMV will not accept other copied or scanned versions.

With these documents, most people who have a Class D, E, F or M license will be eligible for a REAL ID. These new IDs and licenses can not be obtained online.

Those who have a commercial driver's license (CDL) will also need to have their Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration medical qualification certificate, as well as liability insurance information from a company licensed to do business in this state.

Residents are not required to switch to a REAL ID at this time. Existing driver's licenses and ID cards will still allow residents to drive and vote, as well as apply for or receive federal benefits.

Additionally, a valid U.S. passport or passport card, military ID or other federally approved form of identification can still be used to pass TSA checkpoints at airports nationwide. Federal buildings and military installations may have different, specific ID requirements. Contact the building or military installation you're visiting for specific requirements.

Congress passed the REAL ID Act of 2005 as a result of the 9/11 Commission's recommendation to standardize government-issued identifications, including driver's licenses. The State of South Carolina requested an extension to become REAL ID compliant. As a result, current unexpired drivers licenses and ID cards will continue to be accepted to board domestic flights and enter federal buildings until Oct. 10, 2018.

A REAL ID license is valid for no more than eight years.

Waste collection event continues to break records



Georgetown County staff and volunteers took in a whopping 6.59 tons of paper and 10.88 tons of household hazardous waste during a collection event in Pawleys Island on Oct. 28. It was a new record for the Public Services Department's semi-annual Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Paper Shredding event, which takes place each spring and fall on the Waccamaw Neck. The event attracts more people and takes in larger amounts of waste each time it comes around. There was a steady flow of cars with the line starting at 8:15 a.m. and lasting until after the event's scheduled end at noon. The county's Stormwater Division also gave away 12 rain barrels and informational material. These collection events ensure toxic materials are correctly disposed of, keeping chemicals from leeching into the ground and ending up in our water system. Plans are to introduce a similar event in the western portion of the county. The event was held in conjunction with Palmetto Ace's Home Store's Fall Festival.

responsible for assisting with finding sponsorships to help with the costs involved with constructing the course. So far, Pawleys Island Lumber, Pawleys Island Pharmacy, and New South Brewery have each made significant contributions.
