## County to have full scale emergency preparedness exercise on March 20

Area residents may notice some unusual activity at and around 8 Oaks Park on Highmarket Street next week.

That will be the site of a full scale emergency preparedness exercise being put on by Georgetown County Emergency Management on Wednesday, March 20. Georgetown County tries to host a major training exercise annually to ensure emergency responders, health care workers and other involved agencies are prepared for any type of emergency that may arise.

"We've had a lot of real world practice with hurricanes and flooding recently, but there are a lot of other disasters that could occur in our area," said Sam Hodge, Georgetown County Emergency Manager.

The scenario for this year's training exercise is a mass casualty incident involving a school bus that collides with a train while on a field

trip. The exercise will begin at 9:30 a.m. and last until around noon for emergency responders. Health care workers will continue the exercise in their facilities in the afternoon, once role players have been transported to emergency rooms. In the exercise

scenario, hospital emergency departments will already be operating at or above capacity and dealing with staffing shortages due to a flu outbreak.

"This is a way for us to test our

## Public hearing on residency claims set for March 15

A public hearing to investigate accusations against County Council Member Austin Beard concerning his residency will take place March 15. It was delayed in January as a result of a medical emergency experienced by Beard's attorney on the morning of Jan. 18, when the hearing was originally scheduled. Due to the circumstances, the board and the complainant's attorney were agreeable to the postponement.

The public hearing will be conducted by the Georgetown County Board of Voter Registration and Elections. It was scheduled following a complaint issued against Beard by groups including the local branch of the NAACP and the West End Citizens Council. Representatives from these groups addressed County Council and the board in January with claims that Beard does not reside in the district he represents — Council District 5. They have asked that Beard resign.



## County, DNR team up to host youth fishing rodeo at 8 Oaks Park

Georgetown County Parks and Recreation, in partnership with the S.C. Department of Natural Resources, will host a Kids' Freshwater Fishing Rodeo next month.

The event is free and is set for 9 a.m. to noon on Saturday, April 6, at the pond at 8 Oaks Park, 6610 Highmarket St., Georgetown. The County hosted several similar events last year at 8 Oaks and Choppee Recreation Center that were extremely successful, and residents said they wanted to see more kids' fishing events in the future.

Participants in the fishing rodeo are encouraged to bring their own fishing pole, as well as live bait and tackle if possible, but DNR will have a limited supply available for use if needed.

No adult fishing and no pets will be allowed. Participants must be accompanied by an adult.

## County offers tennis lessons at new East Bay Park tennis courts

With new tennis courts now open at East Bay Park, Georgetown County Parks and Recreation is expanding opportunities for children, teens and adults to learn the sport and/or improve their skills.

Beginning March 20, the county will begin offering lessons for youth ages 6-17 on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Cost is \$40 for a four-week program. Lessons for ages 6-8 will be available from 4-5 p.m. Wednesdays or 12:30-1:30 p.m. Saturdays; lessons for ages 9-12 will be available from 5-6 p.m. Wednesdays or 1:30-2:30 p.m. on Saturdays; and lessons for ages 13-17 will be available from 6-7 p.m. on Wednesdays or 2:30-3:30 p.m. on Saturdays.

For adults, Skills and Drills drop-in clinics will take place on Wednesdays from 7-8 p.m. Cost is \$10 (for six or more players) or \$15 (for five players or less). Players will participate in point situational drills in a fun and competitive environment. Adults must be USTA rated 2.5 or higher in order to participate in the clinics.

Georgetown County Parks and Recreation hopes to continue to add new programs at East Bay Park as interest in the sport grows.



# County's new Rec. Zone program keeps kids engaged after school

Georgetown County Parks and Recreation has a new program that's bringing smiles to young faces at recreation facilities across the county. It's called Rec. Zone and it's a drop-in, after school program that offers a wide variety of less structured, supervised recreational activities. The program is getting kids in touch with old and new activities to keep them healthy and keep them engaged.

"It's not so much about teaching as it is about getting to know them personally," said Joey Manigault, Parks and Recreation community specialist for the Georgetown region. "It's about interacting with the kids; watching them play and reinforcing things they might be learning in other programs."

It's also about exposing Georgetown County's younger residents to new activities, such as rock climbing. The department's rock climbing walls at the Beck, Choppee, and Waccamaw Regional Recreation Centers have never been more popular than since the Rec. Zone program began.

Beth Goodale, the director of Georgetown County Parks and Recreation, has been thrilled to see the response to the program.

"We are definitely seeing an increase in numbers of youth taking advantage of what was previously an unguided, 'free play' timeslot in our recreation centers," Goodale said. "Recreation isn't just about sports anymore; this program is also helping us find out what kids want to do for recreation, and provide those opportunities to them."

Manigault said that his favorite part about the program is that it gets him more face time with kids that he might never have previously interacted with.

"The Rec. Zone program helps me live up to my title of 'community specialist,'" he said. "Kids are more involved when we're in the gym with them. It's a great way to stay in touch with the community."

Rec. Zone is available at the Beck Recreation Center in Georgetown, the Choppee Recreation Center on Choppee Road, and the Waccamaw Regional Recreation Center in Pawleys Island from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays.


## Sheriff's Office warns of jury duty phone scam

The Georgetown County Sheriff's Office is warning residents about a scam that has started occurring in the area. In this scam, the caller tells the victim he or she has missed jury duty and asks for personal information, including e-mail addresses, and payment of a fine.

The scammers claim to be with local law enforcement.

Residents are reminded that law enforcement agencies will never ask for money if you miss jury duty. Anyone receiving a call like this should report it to the Sheriff's Office at (843) 545-5102.

With the proliferation of phone and e-mail scams going around, residents should always be cautious of giving personal information or money to someone if they are not 100 percent certain the person is who they claim to be. Instead of clicking on links in e-mails, it is wise to use a trusted search engine to make sure you are navigating to a legitimate link. If you are unsure of a caller's identity, hang up, look up the published number for the company or agency they represent and call back at that number to verify the call. ## Construction of new Yauhannah bridge complete, expect temporary lane closures

Construction of a new bridge over Yauhannah Lake, near the Georgetown/ Horry County line on Highway 701 is now complete, officials with the S.C. Department of Transportation announced on March 14.


The new bridge is being prepared to be opened to traffic. Over the past two months, crews have constructed barrier walls on both sides of the bridge and removed all overhang form work. Grinding and grooving on the

bridge deck has also been completed, which helps improve "rideability" and traction, according to the Department.

In the coming weeks, crews will begin shifting traffic onto the final alignment of the roadway. This shift will require existing asphalt milling, new asphalt paving, and line striping at both ends where the new alignment ties into the existing alignment.

Due to the sequence of work, there will be several consecutive days of single-lane closures. Motorists should expect to encounter flaggers directing traffic during these lane closures, and are asked to be patient and alert when driving through the jobsite.

Replacement of the Yauhannah, Great Pee Dee River and Great Pee Dee Overflow bridges obviously will also necessitate demolition of the old bridges on Highway 701. Nighttime single-lane closures will be required for demotion activities. Demolition of the Great Pee Dee Overflow bridge is already under way.

## Library to celebrate April as National Poetry Month with events

"April is the cruellest month," wrote famed poet T. S. Eliot at the start of his landmark modernist poem "The Waste Land" in 1922. The Waccamaw Library begs to differ.

With three events scheduled that show off a dazzling array of poetic voices, April is the *brightest* month, said Library Director Dwight McInvaill. The Library, located at 41 St. Paul Place, Pawleys Island, has arranged these poetry-centered programs as part of its celebration of April as National Poetry Month. All events are free and open to the public, and are supported by the Friends of the Waccamaw Library.

On Thursday, **April 4 at 3 p.m.**, two returning South Carolina-born poets, accomplished husband-and-wife writing duo Ashley Mace Havird and David Havird, will bring the 2019 edition of the Litchfield Tea and Poetry Series to a fine conclusion. Ashley grew up on a tobacco farm outside Marion, and her first novel "Lightningstruck," — which won the 2015 Ferrol Sams Award and was named an Editor's Choice by the Historical Novel Society — explores this locale as its setting. The current Poet Laureate of Caddo Parish, Louisiana, Ashley has published three collections of poems. Her poems and short stories have appeared widely in anthologies and in highly respected journals.

Professor of English at Centenary College of Louisiana, David studied with James Dickey at the University of South Carolina before earning his doctorate at the University of Virginia. His work has been published in prominent journals such as "The New Yorker," "Yale Review," and "Poetry," and he has new poems in recent issues of "The American Journal of Poetry," "The Hopkins Review," and "Literary Imagination." His poetry collections include "Penelope's Design" (2010), which won the Robert Phillips Poetry Chapbook Prize.

Of their return to their native state to read their work at the Waccamaw Library, David commented, "Growing up, we imbibed the atmosphere of the Lowcountry and the place took root in our being. Reading at Waccamaw will be a homecoming, yes, but in a way, we're always there."



The Havirds' reading will set the table for a reading by a major emerging voice in contemporary poetry, Adam Vines, on Monday, **April 8 at 10 a.m.** Vines has published four poetry books to date, including "Out of Speech" (LSU, 2018).

Vines worked as a landscaper for 20 years in his home state of Alabama; then he discovered his love of writing when he enrolled—by accident—in a creative writing workshop in night school. He is currently Associate Professor of English at the University of Alabama at Birmingham, where he is editor of "Birmingham Poetry Review." During summers, he is on staff at the prestigious Sewanee Writers' Conference in the Tennessee mountains.

Vines will read from his most recent book, which explores connections between painting and poetry.

"Before I had ever written a poem, I sketched and painted. Writing won over. However, I always seemed to go back to visual art in poems, sketching the art I admired with language."

The Waccamaw Library will round out its month-long celebration of all things poetry with the Friends of the Waccamaw Library Student Poetry Contest Celebration on Thursday, **April 11 at 7 p.m.** For the past eleven years, the group has sponsored a student poetry competition. The contest is open to area students ages 12-18 who

attend Waccamaw Middle School, Waccamaw High School, Montessori Charter School and Lowcountry Preparatory School, as well as to home-school students eligible to attend one of those schools. Cathy Filiatreau, the competition organizer, noted, "Everyone has a poem in them somewhere. This is an opportunity to work with FOWL and the Library to inspire young people to try something they maybe haven't tried before, to see if they have a gift for words that they can cultivate."

The contest celebration will feature readings by winning poets, who will receive cash prizes at the event. Filiatreau added, "We are open to all kinds of poems, whatever energizes our young poets' imaginations." The contest fits with the overall aims of the Friends group to enhance the Library as a crucial platform for public education and literacy.

## Month-long celebration featuring tours, exhibits and lectures marks bicentennial of Presidential visit

The Georgetown Library, Friends of the Georgetown Library and the Belle W. Baruch Foundation are excited to announce a month of events celebrating the anniversary of President James Monroe's visit to Georgetown in 1819.

Throughout the month of April, a series of speakers and programs will highlight the President's tour and what our young country looked like during the early 19th century.

The centerpiece of the April celebrations will be a gigantic, 10-panel exhibit entitled: "Your Obedient Servant: James Monroe's 1819 Presidential Tour of the Southern States." The colorful, artwork-filled exhibit was created by the James Monroe Museum and students from the University of Mary Washington, both located in Fredericksburg, Va.

When President Monroe headed south in 1819, his tour took him through South Carolina, and on April 21-22, he spent time in Georgetown County. He was entertained at Prospect Hill (now Arcadia Plantation) by Benjamin Huger and then traveled to Georgetown, where he feasted with local residents and was toasted 22 times.

Other events scheduled to commemorate the presidential visit include:

**April 2** — An opening reception at the Georgetown County Library will take place from 4-6 p.m. Members of the public are invited to come see the 10-panel exhibit and learn about President James Monroe's Southern Tour. Free. This event is sponsored by the Friends of the Georgetown Library.

**April 3** — Take a walking tour of Arcadia Plantation with historical interpreter Lee Brockington of Hobcaw Barony from 2-4 p.m. Meet at the Hobcaw Discovery Center for an orientation by staff and then travel in a car caravan to Arcadia
